<p>Maryland Department of Juvenile Services (Contact: Jessica Dickerson)</p>	<p><b>Human Sex Trafficking (aka., Identifying and Supporting Victims of Sex Trafficking: Role of DJS Staff)</b></p> <p><i>Supporting DJS workers (in facilities and in community) to identify and respond to signs a youth is vulnerable to or experiencing sex trafficking.</i></p>	<p>During the morning session, participants learn about child sex trafficking, its signs, and how to respond based on their position at DJS. The afternoon session leverages a game-based training that asks participants to work collaboratively through a case study about a client/resident and respond to questions.</p>	<p>In-person 1 Day</p> <p>Audience: DJS frontline staff (e.g., case managers, RAs, supervisors)</p> <p>Trainer: DJS Trainers</p> <p>Training offered several times a year in DJS training facilities.</p> <p>Format: Large group discussion, lecture, story-based learning, interactive activities, debrief discussion</p>

Each of the other units includes tailored content for that audience and gives them information about specific signs and steps they should take given their particular context.</p>	<p>E-learning          30-60 min per unit</p> <p>Audience: general public, medical providers, educators, parent/guardians, youth-serving professionals.</p> <p>Trainer: Online</p> <p>Once available, training will be open to users all year on a continuous basis</p> <p>Format: Interactive online activities (e.g., stories, videos, quizzes)</p>
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<p>Healthy Teen Network,          UMBSSW PARI          (Contacts: Sharon Henry,          Alex Eisler)</p>	<p><b>Working with Patients Experiencing Trafficking: Medical Providers in Maryland</b></p> <p><i>This training covers basics of sex and labor trafficking in Maryland as well as signs a clinician/medical staff can look for to spot patients who may have been trafficked, and steps they can take to address these patients' needs.</i></p>	<p>The Human Trafficking 101 unit provides basic human trafficking information (definitions, laws, typical signs) and then tells users to follow the 3 C's. Each other unit tailors content to that audience and gives them information about specific signs and steps they should take given their particular context.</p>	<p>In-person          1 Day</p> <p>Audience: Medical Providers</p> <p>Trainer: Professionals with training experience who are knowledgeable about human trafficking</p> <p>Once available, materials will be open to users all year on a continuous basis. Training scheduling will be at the discretion of the trainer/their organizations.</p> <p>Format: Lecture, large group discussion, small group work, stories, action planning</p>
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
