Courthouse Facility Dogs

- Courthouse Facility Dogs work alongside a professional in a service capacity to assist other people.
- Facility dogs should graduate from a nonprofit assistance dog program accredited by Assistance Dogs International (ADI).
- Each dog receives about 2 years of training.

Facility dogs do not have public access under the 2010 Americans with Disabilities Act because they do not assist a person with a disability. They must pass the same public access test that certifies service, hearing, and guide dogs; however, many state laws provide access to volunteer handlers with a qualified agency.





Courthouse Facility Dogs (continued)

Courthouse Facility Dogs assist crime victims, witnesses, and others during the investigation and prosecution of crimes and other legal proceedings. They also work in drug and mental health courts.
